## Follow up with a Magical Music Moment from Jill

Not quite up to the standard of Barrie’s MMM. But I can give him a bit of a run for his money!

At a very young age, I was taken to the Manchester Free Trade Hall, a building that was born, then died and got to be reborn.

This is the story of the Free Trade Hall in a nutshell. It is safe to say that this building has definitely seen dark days. However, it somehow managed to survive and still be here, standing proudly, not just as a historical monument, but also as one of the most important pieces of English architecture. Built in 1853, to serve as a public hall for political campaigns, it was bombed and destroyed in the Manchester Blitz, then rebuilt as a concert venue, closed, abandoned and today is a hotel owned by the Radisson Company.



When my parents took me along to the Hall, Sir John Barbirolli was conducting the famous Halle Orchestra. The Orchestra was founded in 1858. (No, I didn’t go that time, I am not that old!) I was mesmerised, didn’t take my eyes off the conductor and orchestra the whole time, wanting it to go on and on. I was about 6 years old. I remember, asking my father if we could go again. I did go again but under very different circumstances (explain later).

The list of entertainers is quite extensive. This also includes other “famous people” that had attended the hall over the years. However, unlike Barrie’s list of being with celebs, I was **not there** when all these notoriety were!

And last but not least (Drum Roll please,) Jill Sheppard (Jill Wood in those days aged 12), singing with the “Yew Tree Comprehensive High School Choir”!

**Hell's Gates** is at the entrance to Macquarie Harbour on the west coast of

Tasmania. It is a notoriously shallow and dangerous channel entrance to the harbour. The actual channel is between Macquarie Heads on the west and Entrance Island on the east (the main length of the harbour runs southeast of Hells Gates). This is the Harbour into which the Gordon River runs into and is now home to a number of salmon farms. A Penal Settlement was established on Sarah Island in the Harbour in 1822.
